Surviving Grief and Loss

"I feel dead inside." These are the words of Federal Circuit Court Judge Joan Lefkow. Known for her strong sentencing of gang members, Lefkow and her family

were targeted in a heinous act of retribution that resulted in the deaths of Lefkow's husband and mother. Lefkow herself was away from home at the time and returned to discover the crime. In the months that followed, Lefkow entered into a deep state of depression and guilt. Was it her fault? What if she had been there? Could something have been different? Was this all part of some divine will? Will things ever return to normal?

Over the next many months Lefkow sought out both professional counseling and religious guidance. Some years later, Lefkow remarked that while her life was not the same as it had been, she had begun to experience a powerful sense of resurrection. The love of friends, the solidarity with her daughters, years of counseling, and near constant prayer brought a sense of renewed purpose and self. The tragedy would not serve to end her life.

As a pastor, I am commonly asked several different questions regarding loss and grief:

Is it God's will? What did I do to deserve this? Does God give us more than we can handle? Why did I survive and (someone) did not? Does everything happen for a reason?

These are not easy questions to answer. There are difficult implications to each of them. And to be quite honest, we in the church have not done a particularly good job of answering these questions. We have allowed clichés and platitudes to determine our response. Most worrisome, in place of honest reflection and prayer, we try to find easy answers and quick responses. We struggle to turn to scripture and feel as though we should not raise these questions. How do we find a different path?

Throughout October we will be engaging questions of grief and suffering head-on. Using the Book of Job as our guide, we will look at what it means to suffer loss, to wonder if God is listening, and so see what it means to start life anew. We can never live without loss and grief, but we can seek to better understand how we respond.

Backpack Program

MUMC's local mission project, the Marion School District Backpack Program is in full swing. We had our first distribution Friday, September 21st. We sent 94 backpacks filled with lunch, dinner, and snack items home with the children.

Through generous monetary donations, food donations, and volunteers who work to purchase, take inventory, stock and pack bags, we are able to continue this program helping school children in our district with a bag of food each Friday.

Honoring Youth **Director**, Tim Parker


