Pastor's Pen

Why I wait to sing Christmas Hymns

Without fail, every year I have been in ministry there is always a tension around when to start singing Christmas hymns in worship. Some say hold off until Christmas Eve, others say work one in a week, and others say that as soon as December starts so should the Christmas hymns. I know. This is a hot button topic this time of year. Let me give you a quick rundown of how the conversation normally goes.

| Church goer: | Too bad we didn't sing any Christmas hymns, though. |
| Pastor: | But it isn't Christmas yet. We're still in Advent. |
| Church goer: | But it's the Christmas season. |

Over the years, whether I was a music minster or pastor, I have had that conversation (or one like it) as a bell weather of the Christmas season. Persons begin decorating for Christmas pretty much the instant the Thanksgiving turkey has grown cold in the refrigerator, if not before. They begin seeing advertisements for Christmas sales and products before their children have finished trick-or-treating, if not before. And they seem to turn their car radios to the Christmas carol station when the first gift has been purchased. Yet, in the church, there is another season which in our secular and modern Christmas has become forgotten and overlooked. It is the Advent or "preparation".

While the commercial society transitions to Christmas seemingly earlier and earlier each year, the Christian calendar marks the beginning of the "Christmas Season" in a somewhat counterintuitive manner. We're asked to wait. And not wait in the DMV, doctor's office, roller coaster line manner. No, we're asked to wait in fervent prayer, meaningful worship, and personal reflection. While we visit stores, set-up trees, decorate our homes, and plan parties, Advent rolls along asking us a different question: how do we prepare for the new hope that Jesus brings? The temptation, however, is there to skip over this question entirely, focusing instead upon the obvious joy of the promised Messiah and not our own internal struggle with its meaning.

Jesus' birth marks the beginning of a new era, one highlighted by grace and not retribution. The struggle and oppression of the Israelite people held one promise above all others: God will deliver the people. Jesus was the fulfillment of the promised Messiah. While many others had come claiming to be God's "agent of change", only Jesus could offer a means out of oppression that did not resort to violence. Instead of raising an army, calling for a revolution, or leading a violent revolt, Jesus wandered through the wilderness of Judea teaching, healing, inviting, and reconciling. He was killed because he dared to challenge the status quo, urging people to share God's love and not the Lord's rules. When he rose from the dead, Jesus' victory was not simply over physical death, but was a powerful symbol that no matter what happens, God can raise you again.

Yet, we start singing those Christmas hymns earlier and earlier every year. They bring an awkward sense of comfort. If we start singing the Christmas hymns as early as possible, then the pain of loss so many feels during this time, the financial crises that millions of persons experience, the emotional conflict and spiritual warfare that goes on, the reminder of broken family relationships and interpersonal conflict, can all just be swept under the rug again for another year. When we dare take the time to experience Advent fully, then all those sticky, troubling, hard, worrying, and time-consuming issues surface and demand recognition. They demand that we no longer ignore then but address them fully.

In preparing to meet the new born Jesus, we can meet a new way of life. It is a way of life that calls us to constantly prepare and be repaired for the work of God's reign on earth. We must not try to skip ahead like a child peaking at their Christmas parents, but instead embrace the waiting, embrace the journey, and find healing for those things which weigh us down and burden our hearts. Do not rush through Advent. Christmas will come.

Turkey Dinner 2018

The first "turkey dinner" was held around 1953 (65 years ago) when a church addition containing our first kitchen was built. The first dinner was cooked mostly in church members homes and brought to the church kitchen and served on card tables with probably 25-50 people in attendance. The key founders of this tradition at the time were Helen Williams, Mamie Olive Stokes and Mary Beth Rieves. Around 1963 the turkey dinner side dishes which includes the traditional sweet potatoes, green beans and cranberry relish were prepared in the church kitchen. We have come a long way in 63 years to evolve from 2 or 3 turkeys to 900+lbs of turkey and 480 lbs. of sweet potatoes. We serve 900 people for dine in and carry out.

This year a portion of the money raised will go towards new screens and equipment for our sanctuary. The money raised also goes to support our church building fund and following mission ministries:

- MUMC Hope for the Holidays
- MUMC Backpack Program
- Brooks Howell Home a non-profit charitable continuing care retirement community. Originally, it was established as a retirement home for United Methodist deaconesses and missionaries.
- Hope House provides a food pantry and clothes closet for needy residents of Crittenden County, Arkansas.
- Families in Transition Women and children seeking shelter and services (domestic violence and other situations).
- Good Neighbor Center Coordinates and provide indigent/disaster/emergency relief.
- Steudlein Learning Center— The Frank C. Steudlein Learning Center is a private, non profit community day service center designed to work with children from birth to age five through a variety of pre-school settings.
