We again approach the forty days of Lent. During this season, new and longtime Christians alike hear the call to return to God with all their hearts, thus entering a season historically characterized by much prayer and fasting. You are encouraged to fast, if you are able, from one or more meals on Ash Wednesday. Prayer and fasting are frequently linked together in the scriptures as two significant means of grace. Ash Wednesday is a traditional service that opens the season of Lent. The observance invites us to reflect on our mortality and repentance of sin. The ashes are imposed on the foreheads of the participants in the service as a witness to both repentance and God's grace.

These works of discipline have for hundreds of years served as a means by which new converts prepare for baptism, which occurs as a part of the Easter Vigil. Using the words of Wesleyan theology, we believe all this work is initiated by God, who invites us to come before God with all our hearts.

"Whenever you fast, don't be gloomy like the hypocrites. For they make their faces unattractive so that their fasting is obvious to people. Truly I tell you, they have their reward."

A Uniquely Diverse Body

If you have attended worship on Wednesday evenings, you have noticed a recurring liturgy that we do every week. It is written as follows:

Leader: All are welcome at this communion table. Together, we claim our unity in Christ -- in this time, in this

place, with this uniquely diverse body. Together, we rejoice in God's presence among us as we remember and celebrate this Sacred Meal. Together, we are called to prepare the table. However, as you may have noticed, the table is not yet set. Who will bring forward the gifts God has provided for the table of love,

healing, and forgiveness?

All: We will!

Leader: For Christ is among us and within us, calling us by name to remembrance, reconciliation, and restoration.

Welcome home.

Following this liturgical exchange, persons are invited to come forward and help prepare the table for communion later in the service. The call and response seeks to remind us of the diverse and varied nature of God's kingdom here on earth, and even within our local community and church here in Marion.

The last week of February I traveled to St. Louis to attend the special called session of General Conference of the United Methodist Church. This is the official denominational wide decision-making body. They set our official denominational policies, doctrine, and practices. Uniquely, the United Methodist Church is a truly world-wide body. Delegates come from over 60 different nations to attend. While there are around 6.5 million UMC members in the United States, there are millions more in various African nations, the Philippines, Europe, Russia, Mexico, and South America. To worship, pray, discuss, debate, and observe together indeed is a "uniquely diverse body".

As we here in Marion worship, pray, love, and disciple together, it is important to remember the unique nature of the kingdom of God. It is the one kingdom in which all persons are called to be a part. One needs no special degree, pass a certain kind of test, or have a certain amount of money. Rather, when we express our desire to have a closer relationship with Jesus the Christ the work of God begins to take over. In our baptism we are initiated, through communion we share in Christ's message of love, in worship we commune together, and in service we further share God's kingdom.

I'm proud to be part of this uniquely diverse body, the United Methodist Church. I'm thankful to be part of the uniquely diverse body, the Kingdom of God. I am immensely grateful to be part of this community here in Marion as we continue to work together to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

What is your favorite thing about our church?


My favorite thing about our church is how involved it is in the community with different programs that help people out.


