Hope for the Holidays 2019

Hope for the Holidays has become an annual event and main project for the MUMC youth. The event started in 2006 and has continued to expand since that time. Our youth group is extremely involved with this event; however, it would not be possible without the assistance of many volunteers. Preparation for this project takes year round planning starting with donations of soaps and shampoos from our congregation collected from hotels while vacationing. Without the donations from these trips, the health kit project would not be possible. everyone!!

Our families were provided through the counselors at the Marion School District and the adoption process starts in November of each year. This year the project took on 71 families. For the families not adopted, we sorted through gifts donated from our preschool, our Sunday school classes and individuals. Karen Jones then shops in bulk to fulfill the additional needs for those families.

The volume of food needed to make this event a success is astronomical. In order to raise awareness and encourage donations we set a list of items in need each week and asked our congregation to fill those needs by shopping and dropping off donations in the Narthex each Sunday. Any additional food items needed were then purchased by our youth.

On the morning of December 24th, the MUMC sanctuary was filled with volunteers sharing in a devotional by the youth director, Kolby Jones. Following the devotional, volunteers received instructions for pick ups and deliveries. Volunteers assisted with the loading of food and gifts after double checking the gift bags against delivery sheets. The youth group would like to take this opportunity to THANK ALL who participated to make Hope for the Holidays another success.

MISSION TEAM

The mission outreach team would like to give an update on the projects thus far for the year.

1. The backpack program is in it's 3rd school year of providing food for children in the Marion School District that need assistance regarding nutritional needs.

We are currently supplying 90 bags of food for the weekend each Friday. Included in each bag are breakfast items, snack items, along with lunch and dinner options. We have recently expanded to open a food pantry on the campus at ASU-Midsouth to support the college students that have been identified as in need. College students will have a no fee option that will allow them to have food while there on campus or take a supply of food home if needed. We are so excited and proud of the continuation and recent expansion of this amazing ministry.

- 2. The mission team has also completed service and projects at the Eighth Street Mission this year. The Friends and Fellowship Sunday school class continue to provide a quarterly meal at the Eighth Street Mission. This assistance helps to provide food to the residents of the program and also any individual from the area in need of a meal. The mission outreach team assisted in painting and reorganizing the "Amazing Grace" Mission Thrift store. We also assisted in the grand reopening and attended the Eighth Street Mission annual banquet this year. This participation assisted in providing monetary assistance in their biggest fundraiser for the year. The mission relies on local support from individuals and organizations in the area for its continued operation.
- 3. We assisted the VPA (Visual and Preforming Arts) magnet school with its Fresh Start Initiative by providing hygiene kits to all of the students. We also assisted with food preparation and serving for the program.
- 4. We have provided manual labor assistance including moving furniture, and removing carpet along with clean up to local residents in need due to flood damage.
- 5. We assisted the youth in providing 105 warm delicious thanksgiving meals to elderly residents in Crittenden County.
- 6. The food pantry also assisted in providing food boxes to federal workers during the government shutdown.
- 7. We also provide food boxes during the summer months to the school aged children that received backpacks during the school year.
