

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE

We again approach the forty days of Lent. During this season, new and longtime Christians alike hear the call to return to God with all their hearts, thus entering a season historically characterized by much prayer and fasting. You are encouraged to fast, if you are able, from one or more meals on Ash Wednesday. Prayer and fasting are frequently linked together in the scriptures as two significant means of grace. Ash Wednesday is a traditional service that opens the season of Lent. The observance invites us to reflect on our mortality and repentance of sin. The ashes are imposed on the foreheads of the participants in the service as a witness to both repentance and God's grace.

These works of discipline have for hundreds of years served as a means by which new converts prepare for baptism, which occurs as a part of the Easter Vigil. Using the words of Wesleyan theology, we believe all this work is initiated by God, who invites us to come before God with all our hearts.

This year you will have two options. We will host a drive thru in the morning where you will receive prayers and ashes or join us for our indoor evening service at 6 pm. For those who opt for the drive thru, please enter the portico from the gym area and exit onto Hwy. 77.

Pastor's Pen

Partnership. Did you notice that word in the scripture above? Paul calls the Philippian disciples "partners in the gospel."

The Greek word that Paul uses is actually *koinonia*. The word koinonia is usually translated as "fellowship" but the problem with that rendering is that when we hear the word "fellowship", we typically think of donuts and coffee and conversation. Now, there's nothing wrong with a good donut! I enjoy them myself ... maybe a little too much. But Paul has something bigger in mind.

The Christian fellowship Paul has in mind is a sharing of the same vision of getting the gospel to the world – and then investing personally to make it happen. When Paul thanks God for the "partnership" of the Philippians, he is thanking God that from the very first day of their conversion, they rolled up their sleeves and got involved in the advance of the gospel. Paul knew about the power of partnership.

I don't know about you, but it's all too easy for me to imagine the great apostle Paul as some kind of trail blazing lone ranger, out there writing the New Testament, founding churches, and preaching the gospel all by himself. That's simply not the case. Paul was never alone in his missionary work of spreading the gospel. He had wealthy benefactors like Phoebe, Pricilla and Aquilla, and Lydia. He also had companions like Luke and Barnabas and Timothy. In addition, he was often in contact with supportive local church leaders like Chloe and Junia, the female apostle, and Apollos. Paul was never alone in working for the gospel. He understood the value and the power of partnership.

Partnership means investment – we are all invested in the same goal, the same work, the same mission. One thing is for sure: we are not called to live by the Gospel According to Otis Redding, "sittin' on the dock of the bay, watchin' the tide roll away." Partners have skin in the game. Partners put their back into it. Partners work for a common goal. Partners add their abilities and strengths together to benefit everyone. Partners give their all to support others and partners work to strengthen everyone else.

A few weeks ago, we started a partnership with each other. It's a partnership in ministry, a partnership in worship and service to our community. It's a partnership in which we will learn about each other and how we can work together to share the good news of Jesus Christ right here in Marion and throughout the Delta region.

What are we all about here at Marion United Methodist? We're about being disciples who make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We're about helping other people live life on purpose by connecting with Christ for life – a life-changing experience, a life-forming discipleship, and a life-long mission to change the world. So we're not just members. We're not just people with our names on a roll. We're not just individuals who happen to belong to the same club. We're partners – partners with God; partners with each other.

And, finally, let's remember the words of Paul to the Phillipians: I am "confident of this, that God who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus." This partnership in the gospel: It begins with God, it will continue with God, and it will be completed with God. All God needs is a few good partners.

Saying Farewell and Welcome

Population We: Learning How to Love and Serve Our Community (February 14—March 21)



CURRENTLY READING:



2020 Report from the Trustees:

The mission of maintaining and improving our facilities is important to our community witness. Our buildings and grounds make the first impression on church guests. We want our facilities to command beauty while also keeping an eye on good stewardship practices.

This past year provided several opportunities for our Trustees. One of the first was the opportunity to participate in solar energy through Entergy. This project took a great deal of the year to assess, review and eventually meet with Entergy representatives before deciding to proceed with the project. We saw our first savings in November 2020 and expect to continue these savings from the opportunity offered to schools, churches and other non-profit entities.

Over the past two years we have had issues with the HVAC units in the Family Life Center. The units were approximately 30 years old, and with the church being closed, we had the perfect opportunity to replace the units without disrupting any ongoing events. We replaced a total of six old units with 15 SEER units to hopefully provide us additional savings throughout the upcoming years.

The trustees took advantage of an LED incentive opportunity. Our church is now 99.5% LED lights. We were able to reduce the number of fixtures from 119 to 64 and reduce the number of bulbs per fixture. One of the things our trustees look at throughout the years is our energy usage and with each LED project, we have continued to see our energy costs decrease.

It's hard to believe, but February marks one year since we installed the gym canopy and new doors. This not only provided a noticeable entrance to our gym but has also came in very handy during our summer outreach food distribution program (an extension of our backpack program) and again during our Hope for the Holidays program.

This past year we had our typical spring storms but during May, we had a storm with straight line winds causing damage to our shingled roofs. After several meetings with the insurance adjusters, we were able to obtain approval for all three roofs (Ed Hall, Sanctuary and Family Life Center) to be replaced. That task was completed during December.

Other:

- -We installed additional speed bumps to prevent speeding through the parking lot;
- -Our youth building was updated with paint, adding a focal wall with scripture; purchase of audio/visual equipment to be installed and we made repairs to the gutters that were causing water damage to the ceiling and walls;
- -Replaced electrical receptacles for the annual Hullabaloo meat sales;
- -Replaced a pump for drainage of water between gym and Ed Hall; and
- -We started the process of pressure washing the church and plan to complete during the spring this year.

MUMC Spotlight: Beverly Moore
